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Minutes of the Church Council

April 16, 2015

The St. Pauli Church Council held its regular meeting on Thursday, April 16, 2015 at 7 p.m. at St. Pauli Church.

Members present: Arlo Rude, Cindy Cedergren, Kathy Alberg, Ron Anderson, and Pastor Carl Hansen.

The meeting was called to order by Arlo Rude.

Pastor Hansen opened with prayer.

Approval of Agenda: The agenda was approved as presented.

Secretary's Report: The minutes of the March 19, 2015 meeting were approved as presented.

Treasurer's Report: No report was available at the meeting, but the report was shared with Council members via email following the meeting. Balances as of 3/31/15 were as follows:

Pastor's Report: Pastor Hansen will teach first Communion classes on April 19 and May 3 during the Sunday School hour to four students. First Communion is tentatively planned for May 17.

This year's Lenten round robin seemed to be well received by the participating congregations. Pastor Mark Helgeland will be retiring as Senior Pastor of Redeemer and Black River Lutheran Churches at the end of August.

Pastor Hansen is planning to attend the N.W. Minnesota Synod's convention on Sat, May 16 in Moorhead. St. Pauli is entitled to send two lay delegates to the Assembly.

Pastor Hansen's summer travel plans may be changing from the previous plans. He will keep the Council posted.

Reports of Members in sickness or distress: Council members shared prayer concerns of members.

New Members or Interest in Membership: No report.

Reports:

- WELCA – Church cleaning is in progress this week. Virginia, Jan, Ron & Arlo will meet to discuss plans for cabinetry in the northwest corner of the basement. April 26 is Blanket Sunday, with potluck following.
- Board of Education – The Council supported the recommendation that the Board purchase five Spark Bibles, designed for middle school age students.
- Men's Group – Does not meet

Old Business: Arlo reported he had recorded two worship services on the MIDI Sequencer, plus some hymns.

New Business:

Easter Sunday Service Time: Discussion was held on whether to continue scheduling the Easter service at 7 a.m. or consider a later service time. Pastor Hansen had no objections to changing it if the congregation chooses to do so. This topic could be placed on the annual meeting agenda for a vote. Cindy Cedergren will bring up the topic at a WELCA meeting to obtain their input.

God's Work, Our Hands Sunday: This is a Sunday set aside as an opportunity to serve our community in ways that share the love of God with all people. The date for 2015 is September 13, but churches may select another date of their choosing. Additional information can be found at www.ELCA.org/dayofservice. The Council decided to include a bulletin insert in the March 29th bulletin as an opportunity to get the congregation thinking of a project that would be suitable for the congregation, including the youth. Ideas will be forwarded to Arlo Rude and the Council will review them and make a determination.

The Lord's Prayer was prayed.

Meeting adjourned at 7:40 p.m.

Historic Minutes of the St. Pauli Congregation

10 December 1923

St. Pauli Congregation held its annual meeting in the church on December 10, 1923.

The meeting was opened by Pastor Grimsrud with hymn song and prayer. Thereafter the report of the secretary was read and accepted and then the report of the treasurer was read and accepted.

After that the following officials were elected:

Secretary: O. J. Snetting, one year

Treasurer: T. Stene, one year

Trustee: Martin Mathson, three years

Apportionments Committee: Ole Odegaard,
Paul Borgie, Ed Viken

Sexton: the same as before, Joe Torstveit.

Then was proposed and supported to elect a committee to discuss the matter of religion school with the Ladies Aid, namely Ole Odegaard, Ole Valsvig and Nels Nelson.

Then was elected a committee of three men to collect to the different accounts: namely Ole Pederson, Emil Thune and Ole Helgeson. After this, it was decided to allow four hundred dollars for the expenses of the congregation.

Then it was proposed and supported to authorize the trustees to alter the loan and if possible to borrow the money at a lower interest rate.

On proposal the meeting was ended.

7 July 1924

St. Pauli congregation held a special meeting in the church on July 7, 1924.

The meeting was opened by Pastor Grimsrud with hymn song and prayer. Then he informed about the reason for this meeting, namely to discuss what ought to be done about the church building. It was proposed and supported that the secretary should look up the Storm and Fire Insurance policies.

Kermit Finstad said that the old Hamar Ladies Aid had one hundred dollars that they wanted to give to have the church interior repaired. Chairman Pastor Grimsrud suggested that we should accept this offer with gratitude.

Then it was proposed and supported to paint the church twice and to put a handrail on the entrance stairs and put new panes of glass in the windows, where necessary, and to buy screens for the basement windows.

It was proposed and supported that the trustees should see that this work was done. Proposed and supported to apply to the youths' club to ask if they would help to pay for this work.

On proposal the meeting was ended.

Ways of encouraging the attendance at Luther League meetings was discussed and also the dedication of the illuminated cross. The meeting closed with devotions.

but she forgot to dust.

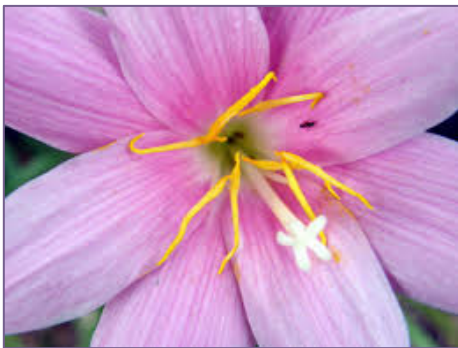
On Wednesday, it was daisies –
